Please submit all manuscripts to:

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Email is preferred. A cover letter indicating that the article has not been previously published nor currently submitted elsewhere must be included with the manuscript. Instructions for submitting Letters to the Editor are explained below. (Online manuscript submission will be available soon.)

Note: Before you submit a paper, you should familiarize yourself with the *Journal* by reading articles from past issues—see the Society for Scientific Exploration website (www.scientificexploration.org/journal).

Aims and Scope: The *Journal of Scientific Exploration* publishes material consistent with the Society's mission: to provide a professional forum for critical discussion of topics that are for various reasons ignored or studied inadequately within mainstream science, and to promote improved understanding of social and intellectual factors that limit the scope of scientific inquiry. Topics of interest cover a wide spectrum, ranging from apparent anomalies in well-established disciplines to paradoxical phenomena that seem to belong to no established discipline, as well as philosophical issues about the connections among disciplines. The *Journal* publishes research articles, review articles, essays, book reviews, and letters or commentaries pertaining to previously published material. Authors should become familiar with the scholarship and style of the *Journal* before making submissions.

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Manuscripts should be double-spaced, and any tables and figure captions should follow the Reference section. Do not embed tables or figures in the text. If there is more than one table, each table should be on a separate page. Figures should be saved in separate files from the text (i.e., if there are three figures, there should be three figure files). Figure captions should be placed in the manuscript file, at the end. Do not include the captions with the figure files themselves. A cover letter from the author must state that publication is requested.

The letter must also state that the article has not been previously published nor currently submitted elsewhere for publication. If this is not the case, explanation and appropriate authorization must be presented for consideration by the Editor. Copyright-marked material will NOT be accepted.

Manuscript Content Requirements: Research articles must conform to contemporary scholarly standards appropriate for an archival journal, and must include an a) abstract, and b) bibliographic citations with the corresponding c) References section. d) Title page should list (1) the article title; (2) the authors' names and affiliations at the time the work was conducted; (3) a concise running title; and (4) suggested keywords for indexing. The abstract must not exceed 200 words in length. It should be concise and complete without reference to the body of the paper. Include purpose, methodology, results, and conclusions in one paragraph (with no headings).

Refereeing: In established disciplines, concordance with accepted disciplinary paradigms is the chief guide in evaluating material for scholarly publication. On the matters of interest to the Society for Scientific Exploration, however, consensus does not prevail. Therefore, the *Journal of Scientific Exploration* necessarily publishes claimed observations and proffered explanations that will seem more speculative or less plausible than in some mainstream disciplinary journals. Nevertheless, those observations and explanations must conform to rigorous standards of observational techniques and logical argument.

Manuscripts will be sent to two or more referees. Which referees are used will be determined by the Editor-in-Chief. If the paper is presented at the yearly conference, it may only have one reviewer. Reviewers are given the option of providing an anonymous report or a signed report. If publication is deemed warranted but there remain points of disagreement between authors and referee(s), the reviewer (s) may be given the option of having their opinion(s) published along with the article, subject to the Editor-in-Chief's judgment as to length, wording, and the like. The publication of such critical reviews is intended to encourage the debate and discussion of controversial issues, since such debate and discussion offer the only path toward eventual resolution and consensus. Letters to the Editor that are intended for

publication should be clearly identified as such. They should be directed strictly to the point at issue, as concisely as possible, and will be published, possibly in edited form.

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
